What is Adopt-A-School?

- Started as a National BSA Pilot Program in 2011 with 15 Councils
- Launched Nationally June 2012
- Help Units address relationship issues with Schools
- Currently 22 Councils in 32 States.
 - 9 Central/Southern
 - 5 Northeast
 - 8 Western

- 130 Schools Adopted
- 5,051 Scouts Have Adopted Schools
- 128 Packs/Troops/Crews Adopted Schools
- 34 Service Projects Performed
- 1,173 Rockers Awarded

How Does it Work?

- 1. Pack/Troop/Crew Approaches School Meets with Principal (Face-to-Face)

- 4. Record Project Hours on Micro-Site that links to Journey to Excellence

Commonly Asked Questions

What is the time commitment for the unit?

At least one year, but our hope is to build strong, sustained relationships with these schools.

How much time (weekly or monthly) is the unit expected to give?

One project per quarter, unless otherwise agreed upon by the school/unit.

What commitment is expected from the school?

School representatives need to help identify their needs and approve the projects to be done.

Who do we need to speak to first? Principal? Teachers? PTA?

Contact the principal first, then involve teachers and the PTA as needed.

Can the unit opt out of the commitment if it's not working for them? Can the school opt out?

Yes, but we hope both parties will do everything possible to honor the one-year pledge.

What if a school is not interested in being adopted?

Contact Adopt-a-School so that we may assist you in building a successful relationship with your school.

How do I deal with unions? Who speaks to them?

Before you officially meet with school officials, we recommend you call them and identify which union representatives might also need to be included in your initial meeting. Then sit down with all concerned to decide the school's needs and how Scouts can be of assistance.



Adopt-A-School Program Benefits

- BSA Adopt-a-School is a process to address the breakdown in relationship between Scouting and the school systems we serve.
- This process is where true community development work can begin.
 A win/win situation for both Scouting and our schools.
- Increase exposure of Scouting values to schools and local community
- Increase membership through positive exposure
- Increase JTE hours



What Else Can Your Pack, Troop or Crew Do?

Invite Principal, BOE members, staff, faculty members to major unit functions (IE: Blue and Gold banquet, Courts of Honor)

Remember the School secretary on certain days

Remember the custodians

Recognition awards (Plaques for School, Patches for Principal)
